LETTER FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM DON'T GIVE UP CHOCOLATE FOR LENT

Lent starts half way through this month. Here's two reasons not to give up chocolate:

- 1. It doesn't do you any good. You'll start again after Lent. Every morning I clean my teeth. That's an automatic habit. To develop a habit you need to repeat it between 70 and 120 times. Forty days without chocolate isn't good enough.
- 2. Giving up chocolate doesn't make you a better person.

As a Christian I'm planning to do something rather than give something up.

Here are some things you could do:

- When you treat yourself buy food of equal value for Foodbank.
- Read a Christian Book. I recommend "What Is The Bible" by Rob Bell. It's an easy read and quite amusing as well as eye opening.
- Best of all, develop a daily habit a "Holy Habit" of spending time in the presence of God. If you start reading a chapter of the Bible every day and, starting with Matthew Chapter One, read through all 4 gospels, that will take you to the middle of May. You will have read about 90 chapters and will probably have developed a habit.

There are some keys to developing a habit. First of all, understand the difference between a resolution and a habit as I've explained above.

Secondly, it's a marathon and not a sprint. So start off with a small task that is manageable. I'm not a fast reader and I read Matthew Chapter One in less than four minutes. Perfectly manageable.

And thirdly, banish the shame. If you miss a day don't tell yourself you've failed. People develop habits by being compassionate to themselves. Just pick up again the next day.

And fourthly, most importantly, do it at the same time every day. I do my devotions at breakfast time over my soggy cornflakes, first cup of tea and my daily pills!

NORMANBY EDUCATIONAL CHARITY What's It All About?

Last year was difficult for everyone and this was no different trying to organise the Educational Charity. It did however highlight that there is some confusion about the Charity. It therefore seemed a good opportunity to explain the background to this unique fund that has been part of Normanby by Spital's history for over 240 years.

The present Charity is derived from a bequest made in 1777 which enabled a school to be built and a teacher paid to educate the children of Normanby by Spital at no cost. With the introduction of state education and other changes, in 1988 the bequest, in the form of a piece of land which was to be let, was registered with the Charity Commission. To reflect the original terms of the bequest the fund remained available only to children resident in Normanby by Spital.

Over the past couple of years there has been a reduction in the number of applications being made for children from reception and junior school age. *The Constitution states the fund is open to children and young people up to the age of 25 years who are in full time education. They or their parents must be resident within the Parish of Normanby by Spital irrespective of where they are being educated.* The fund is not means tested.

Application to the Charity is advertised in the Signpost around October, November. It has been suggested that the distribution date of the money should be posted on social media. The date is not advertised as this could compromise the health and safety of volunteers.

The Charity is registered with and regulated by the Charity Commission and Trustees must comply with its regulations and the law. This includes privacy laws whereby personal information cannot be kept unnecessarily. It is therefore imperative that all information, requested each year, should be supplied so that the fund can be correctly allocated.

NORMANBY-BY-SPITAL PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

What a shame that 2021 has started off as bad as, if not worse than 2020 finished but we do have the Signpost up and running again. Thank you all who edit, publish and distribute the magazine, I am sure we are all very grateful.

Council Matters: A virtual Parish Meeting took place on 12th January and thankfully it was a much calmer meeting than recent ones.

The precept was set at a much higher level this year (£5,748), mainly due to a contested election being called for to elect one Councillor, which will hopefully take place this coming May.

The Council agreed to move forward with a Single Neighbourhood Plan. A survey is currently being worked on and will be distributed in the next couple of months, pandemic permitting. The survey will be designed to elicit views of Normanby residents across numerous topics.

Numerous policies are now in place, which can be seen on the new website: www.normanby-spital.parish.lincolnshire.gov.uk

Highways have been notified of numerous potholes, the subsidence at the bottom of Normanby Cliff and asked if they can suggest any calming measures to stop traffic speeding through the village.

The footpath in the cemetery has eventually been repaired.

A number of residents have requested that the Parish Council investigate adding swings to the play equipment in the Community Park. This request received the support of the Parish Council and has been passed onto the Community Park committee for their action.

A dog poo bag dispenser will be fitted near the school once a suitable location has been found.

A feasibility report for a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is being prepared.

The Education Charity: The Charity Commission's Scheme states that the Committee comprises of 6 Trustees of which 2 will be Nominated, and then appointed by Normanby Parish Council. A nominated Trustee <u>does not</u> have to be a Parish Councillor.

The Parish Council has no role in the Charity apart from appointing the Nominated Trustee.

The role is not arduous but requires the Trustee to attend one business meeting in December to agree accounts, distribution of funds and any other business arising. If an extra meeting is called, it would be expected that the Trustee make every effort to attend.

Due to the term of office expiring for one nominated Trustee - nominations are called for.




We are all looking forward to the Spring when we will be celebrating Easter with an Easter Egg hunt and many more craft making sessions.

PARISHIONER CONTRIBUTIONS


Due to current COVID regulations, most local events are not able to be held. That is having an impact on the number of notices I can place in Signpost each month.

A BOOK FOR LENT

WHAT IS THE BIBLE by ROB BELL



You know that bit where the Pharisees bring a woman caught in adultery to Jesus and ask him if she should be stoned? And Jesus writes in the dust. Well, this book explains that.

And why did Jonah not want to go to Nineveh? Well, Nineveh was in Babylon who were the enemies of Israel. It turns out that for Jonah to go to Nineveh was like asking a British person to go to Berlin in 1941.

And who paid all Jesus' bills?

Rob Bell explores the significance of all these things helping us to see how the Bible (and Jesus) have Jewish roots from 2,000 years ago. Suddenly, all kinds of things that we look at from a 21st century, westernised

cultural point of view come into clear focus.

And Rob Bell writes in an unusual way. It's very conversational. And accessible.

And here's the thing. It has 43 short chapters so that's roughly one chapter a day for the whole of Lent.

Each chapter takes about 5 minutes to read (and then you sit there in amazement at what you've just learnt).

At about £8 that's less than 20 pence a day.

Worrying is like a riding a rocking horse... It gives you something to do but gets you nowhere.

DOG WALKERS - There is an offence of 'Dogs worrying Livestock'

Horses are classed as Livestock, a paddock or grazing is classed as Agricultural land. If a dog chases horses, causing them suffering or attacks them, Section 1 - Dogs (protection of livestock) act 1953 can be used to prosecute the dog owner /person in charge of the dog at the time. Please be mindful to keep your dogs under control at all times.

OP RABON - There is a rise is theft or attempt theft of Land Rovers / Range Rovers and Ford Transits - please be aware and check what security measures you have in place to prevent this.

WELTON PATIENT AND DOCTORS ASSOCIATION




