LETTER FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear friends

As we approach another pandemic affected summer we seem to be at an 'in between' point. Of looking back at what has happened over the past 16 months but now starting to look forward to what may be possible in the future. And if all goes according to plan, welcome the lifting of restrictions on 21st June. In the meantime, we continue to be careful and watchful. I am writing this letter between the church festivals of Ascension and Pentecost: in between Jesus ascending to his Father and leaving the disciples bereft and not knowing what to do. An 'in between' time. And the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the disciples at Pentecost changing and empowering them to go out and proclaim the gospel message.

The pandemic has seen us all adapt and makes changes; to family life, ways of working, social life and facing the many challenges lockdown has given us. Some of those changes have become part of everyday life such as working from home and shopping on line. Our churches too have had to adapt and making changes. Churches are open for private prayer and services are rotating around the group as well as on line and on social media. The church community has throughout this time continued to show and share the love of God.

Changes are also being planned in the Diocese of Lincoln. Falling numbers and financial difficulties need addressing and over the last two years the diocese has been looking at ways to change and restructure the church. The result is the adoption of Resourcing Sustainable Church. This will include a reduction in the number of clergy, the establishment of new patterns of ministry and more involvement of lay people in services and a revision of the current Parish Share system. There will be implications for the churches in the Owmby Group. All PCCs are having discussions on the way forward and are at an in-between stage within this process. Made more challenging because we haven't been able to meet for worship and hold other social activities - coffee mornings, lunches, concerts and a host of other activities which bring us together in friendship but also raises money to support the work of the church. We can look back at times past and be wistful at the decline that has affected not just us but the wider church. But that won't help our present position. Better to pray for the power of the Holy Spirit to empower us as it did the disciples to go out with confidence and explore ways of being church. New ideas and offers of help are always welcome. Change will be inevitable but perhaps there is no better time to leave this 'in-between' period and work together in hope for the future.


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AROUND THE PARISHES

HACKTHORN CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Summer term is well underway, even if the weather hasn't always stuck to the plan! I'm hoping that by the time you read this the weather will have picked up as we have some very exciting outdoor events planned for the children for the final half-term.

All of Hackthorn children have been working very hard in school and we are delighted with their progress. We have just held our parent/teacher interviews to share the good news about how the children are performing. Parents were relieved to hear that, despite such an unsettled year of school closures, their children are happy in school and are catching up quickly with missed learning. We have put in many intervention programmes to enable children to do this and are reaping the benefits.

As restrictions ease, we are looking forward to organising some of our traditional events that the children missed out on last year. We are excited to share that the Key Stage 2 pupils WILL be having their annual production (although we're not sure if they will have a virtual audience or not yet). This year's production is aptly named 'Wow, what a year!'

Year 6 pupils WILL be having their traditional staff vs leavers Laser tag challenge. This year we will be joined by the 2020 lockdown leavers. We're hoping that we will also be able to hold our end of year service in the church.

The summer term is always busy with sporting activities and this year is no exception. One of our parents led a cricket session with our Key Stage 2 pupils, which they thoroughly enjoyed. Consequently, many signed up for a local cricket club. Mr Bullivant has been running an after school multi skills club for Key Stage 1 pupils, which has been well attended and a running club is planned for Key Stage 2 pupils. Year 5 and 6 pupils will soon be participating in Bikeability training.

Although we were unable to celebrate the school's 150th birthday last year, the Friends of Hackthorn School are organising a 150th +1 sponsored walk so watch this space!

As if the above wasn't enough to get excited about, we have just planned two additional one-off sporting events but we haven't shared these with the children yet so make sure you read next month's instalment to find out their reactions.

We have ten new children starting with us in September and transition days have already been arranged to meet them. We are really looking forward to getting to know them.

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JOURNAL OF JOSEPH SNOWDEN

The Life of Joseph Snowden: In His Own Words

In 2015 a diary written by Joseph Snowden, former school master in Spridlington, came to light most unexpectedly and was kindly donated to St Hilary's Church by Francesca Stanley. And what a find it was! This diary is Number 10. with entries 1874-1876. Joseph kept full and detailed records of life in and around Spridlington: the weather, seasonal changes, harvest time, events in the villages and wider afield, news about local people and several accounts of his personal life.

Here are just a few of his entries which show what rural life was like the late 19th century.

Extracts from 1874

2nd February: the hounds met at Hackthorn at 10.30 found 3 foxes in covert. Killed one in covert, another one then turned up to Mr Marshalls, then down again towards Welton and Dunholme. A fine day as could be. Scarce any wind all day

Spridlington Church: *10th February*: Mr Walter and his partner sent men 4 in number to pull down the Church at Spridlington this afternoon, very sharp frost and cold S. E.

5th April: the foundation stone was laid on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. A.W. Hutton. A large company of parishioners, farmers and their wives. A beautiful day as could be wished for.

24th April: I heard the cuckoo for the first time on Friday morning about 7 o'clock as I was walking from Reepham towards Lincoln, fine, fine morning.

Local News

26th March: Sale at Owmby of the late Mr William Howard. Household furniture, 11 horses, cows and 10 pigs. Very fine drying day. Air cold from S.W.

2nd June: Mrs Jane Linton bought 2 pigs of a person who goes about the country, gave 16 shillings for the two. (Now 80 pence in decimal money)

1st July: I was helping Mr Beech to mow his grass dined with him and had dumplings, piece of ham and new potatoes, the first I have seen and tasted this year.

17th July: Mr W Page got all his hay home into stack. Very hot and dry weather, half quantity of hay.

8th August: Mr R Beech, Barley, thrashed on the 22 inst.

16th November: Tom Barker drilled beans in Brickyard (Monday)

Extracts from 1875

3rd August: Onion and Cabbage Seed. I sowed the above - I had a little seed of each to spare.

5th August: Harvest began.

10th August: Joseph Snowden cut his wheat, tied it, but not stooked. Rain.

3rd November: At Spridlington Church Mr Thomas Henry Willows, Farmer of Normanby by Spital was married to Mary Eliza Mason of the above Parish. They were the first couple to be married in the New Church.

It seems that Joseph Snowden was a popular and highly regarded person in the villages. He regularly received gifts. At Christmas 1875 he received amongst others the following presents.

Mrs Taylor a plum cake; Mrs E Sykes, a plum pudding, a cake and a pitcher of new milk. Mr Kirkby 2 links of sausage and 2 mince pies. R. Hall Esq Lincoln, a pork pie, a large plum loaf, 1 lb of tea, 2 lbs of loaf sugar, 1 Bottle Whisky. This must have given him a jolly Christmas.

Extracts from 1876

Joseph's Journal shows what a sociable man he was. There are many entries about his visits to friends, including;

12th January: I went to Lincoln on Wednesday morning stayed at Mr Stoke's until Saturday morning, went to Mr Mason's and stayed with him until Monday morning at 10'clock then went to Mr Taylor to dine, then home at 4 o'clock. Mr Mason was very ill indeed. Dr Brooks attending him same time. Snow and frost were going away.

20th January: I went to Mr B Swain's. Smoked 3 pipes of tobacco and one glass of gin then returned home at 9 pm

29th January: I walked to Fillingham and stayed at Mr Storr's until 31st inst. Fine all the three days. I told him I had been to Harpswell.

Even the smallest details of everyday life are included in his journal such as:

25th January: I bought a mop off G Kingstone;

28th January: Mr Mason's hacking horse died . A very good one indeed.

I mentioned in part two, Mr Staniland, the butcher at Normanby. Well I was taught at Middle Rasen Primary School by his wife. And it may have been thanks to her that I ended up as a delivery person most of my working life. (I spent over 20 years with Royal Mail). When the Grimsby Evening Telegraph required someone to deliver papers round Middle Rasen, they had a word with Mrs S to see if any of her former pupils were up to the task. She recommended me and my course was set.

Now to the festive season; the most back breaking time in a milk person's year. And we had all of one day to recover before starting all over again on Boxing Day. We came close to not even having that, when a new sales manager joined the company. This possible distant relative of Scrooge did not see why we should be entitled to a day off! To cut a long story short, we convinced him otherwise. Although we, so it is said, dream of a white Christmas, nothing could be further from the truth if you have to deliver milk during one. Christmas 1970 made me want to have serious words with Bing Crosby or anyone else who had issued forth on the subject in song. Still we made it through a pretty awful Boxing Day and no matter what the song says, they don't occur very often (thank goodness).

Most people understood the concept of paying for our services, but there was the odd exception to this rather obvious rule. I turned up at a cottage on Owmby Cliff one morning where the residents had moved on without so much as a bye-your-leave. I had lost a few days milk money, but a local TV rental shop were a TV set down as it had gone into the van along with everything else!

Some more people I remember; the Potts family who moved into a small cottage on Cliff Road, Owmby. Mr P was an architect who bought such places and turned them into something quite special. They would live in them for a short while, then sell up and do the same thing elsewhere all over again. His other half however, was determined that one thing had to change. This particular day when I arrived a tarmac drive was being laid. "That is one thing I was going to have before we moved for the tenth time in as many years. I have never had a proper drive in all that time," she told me.

They moved to Glentham and built two houses in Portland stone on Bishop Norton Road that had the living area upstairs and the bedrooms on the ground floor. Very innovative and lovely people.

I recall the Bell family who lived in Church Lane and saw to it that the kids at Normanby Primary school were fed and watered; very good meals by all accounts.

Not far away from the Potts' cottage lived professional painter, Roy Collett. A friend of mine had one of his works; an evocative painting of another time; a ploughman and his horse-drawn plough working the soil. To be honest I don't know whether the Collett residence, off the beaten track, came under Normanby or Owmby. Someone will know I'm sure. Eric Seaton is another name that springs to mind. Eric lived with his two sisters on Fen Road and earned his living delivering daily papers to the surrounding area.

Owmby were pretty formidable opponents in the world of local sport. The village boasted both soccer and cricket teams. I competed against such fine players as the brothers Crowe, Bell, Hockney and Taupin. Ah, yes, Tony Taupin had a younger brother, Bernie. I wonder what became of Bernie Taupin?

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING?

SWIMMING - we have had recent incidents within the last few months where teenagers are swimming in irrigation ponds, fishing ponds and building site ponds. We cannot stress how dangerous this is. The ponds are often in isolated locations and have unknown bacteria and foreign objects which could cause illness or snagging. Please speak to your young family members about the dangers to prevent any serious injury or death.

ASB - Since the ease in lockdown rules we have seen an increase in groups of children and young adults congregating at hot spot locations. We have increased patrols in these areas and are addressing issues such as alcohol drinking, noise, littering and COVID breaches.

COVID RESTRICTIONS - please remember we are still following Step 3 regulations until 21st June (at the earliest).

SPEEDING - We will be conducting speed checks in hot spot areas to reduce the amount of speeding vehicles on our roads.

LOCAL PRIORITY - Every three months, we listen to your concerns and look at recent crime statistics to shape the things we will concentrate on for the next three months. Our priority(s) for the next quarter is:

- 1. COVID 19 pandemic breaches
- 2. SPEEDING proactive speed checks

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
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
