AROUND THE PARISHES

HACKTHORN CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Hackthorn's 'Surprise School' has been open for the children of critical workers since the Government's 'surprise' decision to close schools for the majority of children in January. Hackthorn staff have worked tirelessly, under difficult circumstances, to maintain provision and continuity of the curriculum, ensuring the children's education and personal well-being does not suffer detrimentally due to Covid-19.

The children are engaging brilliantly with their remote learning. We are so incredibly proud of how quickly they have adapted to the new way of learning. Our children have a daily English lesson, via Zoom, followed by a Maths lesson from Oak Academy and a non-core subject task each afternoon, in addition to practising their tables, spelling, handwriting and reading. It has been a pleasure for us to see the children during zoom lessons; they listen beautifully and participate so enthusiastically! We have even had governors carry out monitoring duties during Zoom lessons!

Our school community still connects weekly through assemblies. One never knows quite what to expect in our Monday Visitors' Assembly. This week Mr Beverley had an arm wrestle with a puppet! Our Friday Good works assemblies now start with a 'Hi-de-Hi Hackthorn' greeting on the xylophone, which brings a smile to the attendees. Each week different children share examples of their work. The English work has been particularly impressive.

This week is Children's Mental Health Week. We have been sharing various resources and ideas with the children about looking after their mental and emotional health as well as their physical health.

We cannot predict what the coming weeks or months will bring but I have no doubt that our school community will continue to pull together and our 'Hackthorn Way' values will shine through. We have received so many wonderful encouraging comments and support from parents, governors, staff, pupils and friends. I am so proud of our Hackthorn community.

As Captain Sir Tom Moore said

"We will get through it in the end but it might take time, at the end of the day we shall all be ok again... the sun will shine on you again and the clouds will go away."

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

A young woman went to her mother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up. She was tired of fighting and struggling. It seemed as one problem was solved a new one arose.

Her mother took her to the kitchen. She filled three pots with water. In the first, she placed a carrot, in the second she placed an egg, and the last she placed some ground coffee beans.

She let them sit and boil without saying a word. In about twenty minutes she turned off the burners. She fished out the carrot and placed it in a bowl. She pulled the egg out and placed it in a bowl. Then she ladled the coffee into a bowl. Turning to her daughter, she asked, "Tell me what you see?"

"A carrots, an egg and some coffee," she replied.

She brought her closer and asked her to feel the carrot. She did and noted that it was soft. She then asked her to take the egg and break it. After pulling off the shell, she observed the hard-boiled egg. Finally, she asked her to sip the coffee. The daughter smiled, as she tasted its rich aroma.

Or am I like the coffee bean? The bean actually changes the hot water, the very circumstance that brings the pain. When the water gets hot, it releases the fragrance and flavour. If you are like the bean, when things are at their worst, you get better and change the situation around you.


When the hours are the darkest and trials are their greatest do you elevate to another level? How do you handle adversity?

Handwoven Tote Bags

We are pleased to be able to offer a limited number of tote bags for sale. They are individually crafted in the Masasi area using traditional techniques. We thought this would be a good idea as we anticipate a reduced demand for palm crosses this year and that this is a way of villagers being able to gain a bit of extra income.

They are made from dried branches of the dwarf palm

'Hyphaena Coriacia' (as used to make the palm crosses). These grow wild and so are not cultivated or chemically treated, this has no impact on the environment and is sustainable.

The bags are made from 100% biodegradeable material.

Each one is handmade and therefore unique in colour, style and design. Overleaf there are some examples that show the skill involved in each handwoven bag.

Dear Friends,

The Covid 19 pandemic has affected every part of our lives, and that of our church also. Not being able to gather together to worship, to meet socially or attend events has had a big impact on the life of St Hilary's - both the spiritual life that we share and the financial repercussions as a result of no activities. Sadly, the financial picture is grim and this letter is an appeal for your help and support which would be greatly appreciated.

The regular day-to-day expenses of running our church cost us over £7,500 per year and, in a "normal" year, these expenses exceed our regular day-to-day income by about £2,600 per year.

We would normally try to make up this shortfall through local fundraising activities and donations. However, the current pandemic has obviously significantly impacted on our ability to fundraise and much of our other income from services has been reduced.

Therefore, there is a real threat that PCC funds could be reduced to zero in the not too distant future, thus threatening the very existence of the church as a beautiful, useable asset to our community.

Additionally, 2020 was certainly not a "normal" year - nor will 2021 be.

COVID is continuing to impact on our income streams, and the PCC is also faced with imminent, unexpected bills for repairs to the inside floors and outside walls of the Church, both of which need immediate attention.

PCC funds could therefore be fully consumed even sooner.

The PCC is extremely grateful for financial support it receives by way of regular standing orders, donations made at church services, donations made outside of church (eg at coffee mornings - when we are allowed to hold them!) and any other sources of support.

Any additional help would be gratefully appreciated. We are committed, with your help, to continue to run and maintain our wonderful Church to meet the spiritual and social needs of our community when people most need us.

HACKTHORN CHURCH FINANCIAL SUPPORT



The church annual expenditure for 2020 was £7000, down £1655 on 2019 (not including building repairs). It is funded significantly by 19 regular church & non church goers mostly through Gift Aided Donations to whom the Parochial Church Council are very grateful for their continued support.

Pre COVID the expenses were creeping up, & there are always some repairs to be done on the building. £3530 was spent (out of reserves) on partially

decorating the church last year.

Sadly due to COVID, legal Church use restrictions, and very limited fundraising activity, excess income fell by £4000 in 2020 compared to 2019 & could be similarly down again in 2021 without more financial support from the community.

"ARCHBISHOP" BY MICHELE GUINNESS



SPRIDLINGTON C OF E SCHOOL: A BRIEF HISTORY

Some years ago I began to research the history of Spridlington Old School but to be honest my work was put to one side until "The Lockdown." Spurred on by Barbara Hinch's article in February's issue (The Lockdown and Me), I have gone back to my earlier research and hope to now finish what I started a few years ago. I am a former teacher and live near the old school which is now used as the Village Hall, so it is perhaps not surprising that I have an interest in the history and stories behind the old village school.

Education in Spridlington can be traced back to 1839 when two houses on Faldingworth Road were sold to pay for the erection of a school house which became parish property. The first teachers were Joseph Snowden and his wife Christina (or Christiana). When it became disused in 1869 it was converted back into two properties.

Building of the new school, situated on Owmby Road, began in 1869, in anticipation of the major changes to education which were being proposed by parliament. The Rev H. F. Hutton personally financed the project, with the initial cost being £40.00. In1870 the Foster Education Act became law and for the first time there was a national, compulsory system of state education for children between the ages of 5-12 years.

Pupils attending the new school would have been taught in accordance with the 1870 Act, although there was no formal curriculum laid down in the Act. Teachers were mostly free to teach what they believed to be right although they would have been influenced by the local vicar and the board of governors. The 1870 Act was passed in response to political and economic factors. Britain was seen, at that time, as the major industrialised country in the world and therefore it needed its citizens to be literate and numerate in order for the country to compete and indeed colonise throughout the world.

Many parents resented their young children receiving compulsory education. In a rural community such as Spridlington, many men were employed as farm labourers and women and children were often involved in farming practices throughout the year. Children between the ages of 5 and 12 would have helped out their parents at harvest or lambing time and so the changes to the education system had financial implications for families who were paid very low wages and lived in poor housing.

During the incumbency of Arthur Wollaston Hutton (1873 - 1876) the school district of Spridlington was extended to include Saxby and Firsby. Additional accommodation was therefore needed in the school and consequently an additional classroom was built. The school was then used on Sundays as a temporary church until St Hilary's Church was consecrated in September 1875. The school now having two classrooms meant that teachers could, in theory, provide more suitable teaching for a range of ages and abilities. However, most of the didactic teaching for the older children was based on copy writing from a board and committing facts to memory. The infant children probably faired better, with more open and practical learning opportunities, although for much of the time the younger children probably experienced the same knowledge based learning and copying exercising that we now refer to as "learning by rote".

TALES OF A 1970'S MILKMAN



Part One

I became a milkman on a chilly morning in early March 1970. For the next 8 years I would be delivering milk, butter, cream, etc, to the villages that are served by the Signpost magazine. For the first two weeks the days would be long, getting used to calling on around 400 households with their daily requirements. I even missed the first FA cup final for years as money collection day took even longer than it would when I had settled in. But I was quickly introduced to the level of friendliness I would encounter often in this neck of the woods, when a kind lady, Mrs Warner at Cold Hanworth asked if I would like to join her family and watch the match with them. I had to turn the offer down, boss Charlie, back at the diary would not have been too happy.

Come to think of it, offers of tea, coffee and snacks were always there. Friday, another long pay-day had its culinary moments; Mrs Daubney at Hackthorn was ready with tea and homemade pastry. The Wests at Glentham also. As there were four hours between these two calls, I had time to work the calories off. Mr West now retired, had had the type of job dreamed of by most small boys; a fireman on a steam train. There was Mrs Cox at Spridlington and the Manns and the Graves again at Hackthorn who kept me hydrated on Mondays and Saturdays respectively. The Storrs at Saxby often had the kettle boiling as well.

I was more than grateful to all these lovely folks but a daily stopover was needed and the Clarks at Glentham came to the rescue with that one. Margaret and Albert ran the café on the main road opposite the Crown Inn. On this occasion I had to earn my cuppa. Albert delivered papers to the surrounding area by bicycle and I saved him a journey to the outer reaches of his round: a fair trade.



It was just after my normal break there one morning, when tragedy struck! Next door in a small detached cottage lived an elderly lady probably in her late 70s. On collection day we had a system; I knocked once, entered and on the kitchen table would be my money, always the correct change, waiting for me. My customer would be standing in exactly the same spot; to the right of the fireplace, one of those old fashioned affairs that worked as an oven and heated water as well.

This particular Friday there was no sign of her. Then I saw her laid face down on the mat across the front of the hearth. A quick check, yes her breathing was shallow but she was still alive. No mobile phones then, so I rushed round to the Clarks and they sent for help. Sadly it was too late, she had suffered a massive stoke and died later in hospital.

To end on a happier note...

A lady at Spridlington who was housekeeper for retired farmer Mr Albone spotted my obvious distress, one morning during that freak summer of 1976. I was not a hat wearer and was experiencing the effects of the unusually hot weather. I was feeling really groggy.

"Mr Albone has several straw hats," she said, "I will get you one."

It literally saved my life. I often wondered, when Mr Albone saw me wearing it did he know it was his or did he think, "Oh I have one just the same as that."
