**Elections - 6 May 2021:** On the Thursday 6 May 2021 voters in Normanby by Spital will go to the polls to elect two new Parish Councillors. This election will take place at a time when COVID 19 continues to present risks to public health. Measures will be in place to ensure your safety.

It should be noted that there has been a change to where the Polling Station for Normanby by Spital can cast their vote. For this election, the Polling Station will be in Glentham Village Hall and **NOT** in Normanby Village School as in previous elections.

If you, or anyone you know is unable to get to Glentham Village Hall please give the Clerk to the Parish Council a call on 07779 302671 who will endeavour to get one of the volunteers to give you a lift.

**Bullying, Harassment and Abuse -** It is with great sadness that we, here at Normanby by Spital Parish council, find ourselves in a position where we are having to write this statement.

On Saturday evening, 10 April 2021, and Monday evening, 12 April 2021, two very derogatory notices were placed within the Community Park and on the Normanby and Owmby Community Facebook page these were directed at one of our Councillors. The notices were nothing short of hateful and divisive; not something that this Council will tolerate under any circumstances. Parish Councillors have the right to conduct council business without having to face bullying, harassment and hateful statements being directed towards them. Such actions are not only upsetting to the individual and their family but to other residents within our community and it is with that in mind that the matter has been handed over to the Police for further investigation.

This Council hopes that the perpetrators will come to realise that such actions are unacceptable and unnecessary but above all will not be tolerated within our community under any circumstances. It must always be remembered that Parish Councillors are accountable to the electorate and tasked with ensuring that all guidelines are adhered to. Accountability is not about blame and punishment; it is about acceptance and learning.

#### <u>SPRIDLINGTON OLD SCHOOL: A BRIEF HISTORY - PART 3</u> JOSEPH SNOWDEN: BORN AND BRED IN SPRIDLINGTON

We all leave footprints in our lives. For many of us these markers are recorded by official records, preserved through letters or diaries, or passed on through family stories that remain long after we have died.

What I know about **Joseph Snowden** has been gleaned from several sources which show the mark he made on Spridlington. This part of his story is taken from the official census records from 1841 to 1881 and also from Parish Vestry Meeting Minutes between 1865 and 1882.

Joseph was born in Spridlington about 1801. The 1841 census records that he was living in the village of his birth with his wife Christina and son George aged 10 years. His occupation is described as Agricultural Worker. In 1861 he is described as School Master, in 1871 his occupation is recorded as Retired School Master and in 1881 at the age of 80 he is again recorded as Agricultural Labourer. Village life and working on the land were in his blood. These are the bare facts of his life. We know a little bit about him as a school master (see last month's Signpost "An Inspector Calls") and we also have other information about him.

Parish Vestry Meetings were held in the old school room (The first school where Joseph Snowden was School Master). Joseph was very much part of his community attending several Vestry Meetings where he was part of the decision making.

An extract from 26th March 1868:

"Several letters from the Poor Law Board upon the subject of letting the Parish Property belonging to this Parish having been read. It was proposed by Mr Sutton - Churchwarden, seconded by **Joseph Snowden** that this meeting do consent to the Guardians of the Poor of the Lincoln Union letting the Parish Property that is to say six cottages situated in the Parish of Spridlington now or late in the occupation of George Taylor, John Turner, Thomas Freeman, Thomas Andrew Snr, Thomas Andrew Jnr, and Joseph Snowden."

Minutes also record other decisions that would have had an impact on Joseph's life.

In 1871 it was resolved that the Overseer of the Poor give notice to **Mr Snowden** to quit his home at the proper time. One year later it was resolved that one pound per annum be the rent laid upon the cottage now occupied by **Mr Joseph Snowden**. In 1875, a committee was requested to inspect the house now occupied by **Joseph Snowden**, and to report upon its condition to a special meeting of the Parishioners.

The Parish discharged some of its charitable duty when every New Year's Day it "doled out" £5 to be distributed amongst the poor of Spridlington by the Churchwarden of Spridlington.

From 1872 - 1883 **Joseph** received between 3 shillings and 6 shillings annually. A total sum of 59 shillings (about £3.00 in decimal money).

Spridlington Parish extended this duty of care when in March 1882 it is recorded that: "Mr J Harrison proposed & Mr Sykes seconded that Mr Boulton's bill of 12/- for medical attendance on **Joseph Snowden** in April 1881, be paid out of the Constable's Book. Carried unanimously.

This is the final time in the Vestry Minutes where Joseph Snowden's name is mentioned.

These are the bare facts of what is known about **Joseph** through official sources. The picture painted is one of service to the community as a teacher, a life of poverty, ill health, poor housing, notice of eviction and rent increases. It's a sorry tale - but it is not the full story. **Joseph** kept a personal journal that gives us a unique glimpse into the past and into his day to day life in Spridlington.

I am sure, if He had, that that little black dog Knew, right from the first, He was God; That he needed no proof that Christ was divine, And just worshiped the ground where he trod. I'm afraid that He hadn't, because I have read How he prayed in the garden, alone; For all of His friends and disciples had fled Even Peter, the one called a stone. And, oh, I am sure that the little black dog, With a heart so tender and warm. Would never have left him to suffer alone But, creeping right under his arm, Would have licked the dear fingers, in agony clasped, And, counting all favours but loss, When they took him away, would have trotted behind And Followed Him guite to the Cross. #### TALES OF A 1970'S MILKMAN

On trips through Normanby, I notice one change that I would have loved to see back in the 70s; street lighting. Four days a week I started my round in Highgate Lane and a few lights would have made all the difference. They may have saved me getting into bother with one customer.

To save my legs I thought I would cross the front lawns of the council houses on Main Street. One house had a small hedge to hop over. One morning there was a note left for me. The message pointed out that I was leaving a hole in the lawn (where I was landing), so would I please use the path provided. Whoops! See what I mean about street lighting?

On the other side of the road there were some OAP bungalows, and as I was depositing the milk on the doorstep of one of them, the door opened and the lady who lived there said to me, "Tony, could you help me please?"

We went into the front room and she sat down on the settee and handed me a pair of-stockings! She explained, "It's my arthritis, I can't bend very well." The sight of a twenty seven year old dad of two putting on, expertly it has to be said, an eighty something year old lady's stockings would not have been an everyday occurrence I would think. Luckily we soon reached the point where my customer's rheumatic state was no longer a problem and she took over.

Whereas this lady needed my help, I was pleased with a helping hand from someone else.

Every now and again the dairy set up sales competitions. Over a period of six weeks we had to sell as much of a certain product as possible. There were prizes to be had. Some of my colleagues really got into the swing of it, but I tended to rely on a leaflet drop and let nature take its course.

After five weeks, things were not going well, and then it just so happened that the Burkitts from Cliff House, Owmby were to throw a dinner party. And they wanted some cream -six pints all told! No nipping off to Tescos then, just send for the milkman. They saved the day. Forget the clogged arteries, I was a winner.

It was not always your regulars who boosted your sales. One morning in Spridlington I was asked to drop some milk off at this average-sized wooden building that had appeared overnight in a field on Owmby Road. It belonged to a group of travelling evangelists. They stayed for a few days, and then they dismantled the house of prayer and moved onto their next destination. Have Church will travel.

They didn't bring their accommodation with them; they made a base in a room on the upper floor of the barn for about six weeks. They came year upon year, and they liked their milk. No competitions this time, just more profit for the Dairy.

I'm writing this piece looking out on a snow covered lawn, and it has reminded me of a morning in winter when, because of road works, I had to divert through the park at Hackthorn, and what a beautiful sight it was that greeted me - with all the trees white over after a heavy frost the night before. A few brief moments in time that takes you away from the reality of the raw cold penetrating your bones, and made me realise that this was one of the reason's I loved doing this job in the first place.
