HACKTHORN & COLD HANWORTH

HACKTHORN C. OF E. PRIMARY SCHOOL

The summer term is always busy at Hackthorn school but this year's seemed even busier. COVID restrictions had prevented us from holding many of our 'traditional' events, but this summer, with restrictions easing, we were able to re-instate some of these and add a few new events.

'Opportunity' is one of our school values. As such, we are always keen to give the children a wide variety of experiences. We felt that the children deserved a treat because they had worked so hard during remote learning but had also missed out on many experiences so we had a 'WOW' week at school. On Monday, the children participated in Drumba (a high-energy workout session based around a mix of popular music whilst learning and playing a drum) and on Tuesday the children participated in interactive animal workshops run by Zoolab. Wednesday was most children's favourite day as they all had the chance to attend a fun fair on the school field. Children were shocked to see that a large inflatable slide, a swinging chair carousel, bungee trampolines and traditional stalls had magically appeared on the field but the biggest shock was that Mrs Appleby had spent money! On Thursday, the school was filled with enticing aromas as KS2 made their own bread whilst KS1 created indian take-away delights. The week ended with the current Y6s and the lockdown Y6s having a Lasertag tournament against the staff. Once again, the staff retained their winning title! The current Y6s then returned to school for a sleepover. Such a busy week but one that the children (and staff) will remember for a long time.

For the second year running, we held a socially distanced Leaver's Day picnic and service on the field, attended by Y6 parents. As usual, there were lots of tears as the children and their teachers shared memories.

We have welcomed ten new children to our school this week. It was wonderful to see such happy faces on the first day as the children were able to reconnect with their friends after the holidays. Restrictions have eased so we are now able to 'mix' again and reinstate whole school assemblies. We LOVE singing at Hackthorn and have really missed it over the last two years so you can imagine the joy when we sang together inside for the first time - it was overwhelming. KS2 are hoping that we might even be able to attend Young Voices this year!

We always ask the children to be observant at the start of the year as there is usually something new to spot! This year was no exception and it didn't take long for the children to find the new outdoor gym. This has proved a very popular addition. Mr Tuplin's memorial bench has now been installed in the reflection area and many children have been fascinated by the wonderful carvings of owls and a ukulele on it, thanks to the craftsmanship of Chainsaw Mick.

It will soon be time for parents to start thinking about choosing that all-important first school for children who are due to start in September 2022. We will be organising some activity days soon to give you an opportunity to see our school in action and allow your child to experience what we have to offer at first hand.

NORMANBY & OWMBY

NORMANBY-BY-SPITAL PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Since my last input into the Signpost, we have seen the retirement of Mr Roy Bellamy after many years loyal service to the village. I am sure you will all want to join me in say a big thank you to Roy for all his hard work for the community over the years. On the 4 August 2021 the Council held an extraordinary meeting to elect their new Chair. Cllr Angela Hanson was duly elected and accepted the position.

The Parish Council wanted to ensure the community of Normanby was aware of the recent Freedom of Information requests it has received over the last few months. Everyone is entitled to ask public bodies (of which Normanby Parish Council is one) for copies of document or data - the public body has 20 working days to provide this or provide details of the legal exemptions that prohibit them providing the detail.

The issue with the FOI requests received, is while the Council absolutely supports the right of the community to hold them account and provide copies of documents the Council has used in making decisions, the cost of administering the FOI requests and the responses, falls on the Council and subsequently the community. The Council wish to make the Community of Normanby aware of the requests and the costs involved.

As you will note below, none of the FOI requests came from Normanby residents.

The following were requests that the Parish Council were legally obliged to respond to.



Many parents would not let their kids (187 in all) anywhere near this travelling torture chamber. It didn't help that the dentist had gained the nickname; THE BUTCHER. Now as my dad was one, I knew only too well what that entailed. To be fair the dentist and his nurse were probably nice people really.

To ease the pain, there were the school trips; there was the ubiquitous outing to the Lincolnshire show. You had a choice with that one; a day at the show or a day off. Either way, it was a day without lessons. In the early years, trips were organized to such diverse places as the beet factory at Bardney and Louth county hospital and to Liverpool. Does any of the following ring any bells?

As the years past, skiing trips and even a cruise became an 'educational outing'. It would seem that the teachers were always on the lookout for something different to take pupils on. In the 60s a small group of the older pupils spent the weekend in Lincoln shadowing the hardy souls whose unenviable task it was to keep the streets of our fair city safe and problem free through the night.

It must be a huge responsibility when playing chaperone to a group of young people who are at that 'funny age.' Eyes in the back of one's head would be of use. And that was never more obvious on one particular 'awayday'.

Towards the end of the 60s, did anyone go on the trip to the bright lights of London courtesy of the Flying Scotsman? The boys and girls who took advantage of this wonderful opportunity were taken through the procedure of what to do if by chance someone became detached from the main party. And guess what - it happened! One girl missed her tube connection as the group was making their way back to Kings Cross. She kept her cool and followed the advice given by the grown up's and before too long, teacher and pupil were reunited. Unfortunately by the time this reunion took place, the train everyone else was catching had departed for the big skies of Lincolnshire. It was February and to add to the excitement a snow warning had been issued! British Rail came to the rescue. They would make their way home via the mail train. (The travelling post office).

It would most likely be the first time 'civilians' had entered this domain since August 1963, when the great train robber's had arrived unannounced and helped themselves to nearly three million pounds in used notes. As far as this young lady was concerned, it was not a bad way to make the trip to and from London, taking a ride on not one but two iconic trains. And they beat the snow.
